TAX ROLLS SO STRONG THEY HURT

Enormous Increase in Assessments in Kalamazoo County is in Prospect.

START CALLING FOR BIG RAISE

Tribute to Be \$21,000 Larger than Last Year, as State Treasury Is Broke.

COUNTY ROADS BUDGET

Probable Addition of \$40,000 Expected From New Law—City School Taxes Largely Decreased—County Needs More This Time.

Winter taxes in Kalamazoo county will this year run dangerously close to \$350,000, aside from regular city, village and township taxes and school taxes outside the city. The rolls for state, county, city school and county road taxes will probably exceed the rolls of last year by \$60,000.

This enormous increase is due to three main causes. Making up the shortage of the state, a general fund for the county, and the county roads fund. This increase comes in spite of the fact that city school taxes are greatly reduced.

State Hits Hard.
This great state of Michigan which Fred M. Warner and Lawton T. Hemans talked so much of last fall, is making a raid on the counties. Kalamazoo was last year called on to raise \$84,637.45 for the state. This year the call is for \$119,681.79, an increase of \$35,044.34.

County Is Short.
Kalamazoo county is running somewhat behind. Taxation was reduced last year, because no general fund was raised. There will be a deficiency.

CHAIN GANG IN CITY FOR HOBO

SHERIFF CAMPBELL WILL ATTEMPT TO GET LEGISLATION BY SUPERVISORS.

CITY IS NOW FLOODED

Demand for Help Is Universal Cry All Over State But Hobos Continue to Flood City.

If Sheriff Campbell has his way and secures the passage of favorable legislation at the meeting of the supervisors next week, Kalamazoo will soon cease to be a favorite winter resort for the hobo element. He stated today that he would endeavor to have a chain gang organized for the purpose of eradicating the tramp evil from the city.

"Already the tramps are commencing to flock here and from present indications the city will be more badly infested than it was last winter," he remarked. "Last winter they were given free lodgings and no questions asked. As a result we had from fifty to sixty sleeping in the jail, and when the horde was turned loose in the morning they scattered about the city, where the people fed them with but protest. Times were hard then, and it was hard to distinguish the worthy from the unworthy."

"Now it is different. Farmers, contractors and manufacturers are seeking help. There is no excuse for any able-bodied man to be idle. I do not want to be harsh against a body who is really unfortunate, but when a man refuses to maintain himself when he can get work and is able to do it, he ought to be made to labor even if it is necessary to put a ball and chain on him and a guard over him. Such a law will soon drive the professional moochers from the city."

Many communities elsewhere are adopting this system to drive the confirmed tramp away, and are finding it effective.

ROBBERS GRASP J. SMITH'S GOLD

AGED MAN, REPORTED DRUNK, SAYS HE WAS RELIEVED OF ABOUT \$40 LAST NIGHT.

TWO SUSPECTS IN JAIL

Deputies Burns and Hycoop Grab Two Men with Money—Search for People Who Have Given Change for Gold.

Search is being made for people who have, within the last twenty-four hours, given change for gold. If such people are located the men who robbed Jake Smith near Nazareth Academy last night may be identified. Jake reports the loss of something over \$40. Two suspects picked up last night by Deputy Sheriffs Burns and Hycoop are being held for investigation. They give the names of William Williams and Edward Harvey. They are apparently of the hobo species.

It is claimed that Smith was drunk last night and that he was known to have money. He is not positive he can identify the men who robbed him, but he says there were two. They accompanied him from the city to near his home, which is in the vicinity of Nazareth.

The men arrested had about \$25. They said they had worked for it. Smith says he had a \$20 gold piece, a \$10 gold piece and some silver. The hunt for money changers is on.

Donovan pitched a star game and was steady and well balanced along the entire route. Ty Cobb's work on the bases was a revelation to the Pittsburg fans. His sensational steal for home sent the Tige fans crazy.

DOCKED TODAY FOR REPAIRS

JOHN IDORN, AFTER 10 APPEARANCES BEFORE JUDGE MASON GIVEN 15 DAYS.

IS REGULAR CUSTOMER

When Arrested Last Night Was Navigating Along East Main Like a Worn Fence Rail.

So strong is his regard for Judge Mason, it is impossible for John Idorn to keep away from his honor, and this morning he paid his nineteenth visit to that judicial officer. As a result of the meeting, John is now doing his nineteenth stint at the county jail.

Idorn left Kalamazoo after his last term in jail and betook himself to the rural communities of the north, where saloons are wider apart. After remaining in rustic seclusion for three months he was lured back to the riotous life of a city and immediately upon his arrival he proceeded to reduce the available supply of booze.

When intercepted by a policeman last night he was navigating along Main street west like a worn fence rail. At Rose street, his course was changed due south to the jail and then east to the cell block, where he was dry docked for overhauling.

PATTERSONS GET THEIR MEDICINE

SENTENCES PASSED ON THREE MEMBERS OF GANG WHO PLEADED GUILTY TO ASSAULT.

ST. DODE DISPLEASED

Talks of Pulling off Another Job to Get Winter in Jail—Straight for Ed Clyde—Prison and Fine for Dode.

Dode Patterson—65 days in Detroit house of correction. \$10 fine and \$40 costs, with alternative of 25 days additional imprisonment.

Clyde Patterson—90 days in house of correction.

Ed. Patterson—30 days in county jail, \$5 fine and \$30 costs, with alternative of 30 days additional in jail.

These sentences were this morning passed by Judge Knappen on the members of the Patterson gang, principals in the Galesburg riot of June 7. They had pleaded guilty to assault and battery after three days' trial of one member on the charge of resisting an officer.

"It beats h—l," said Dode after the sentences. "They turn a man out of jail in the middle of winter when he can't get a job. Guess we'll have to pull off a job of assault and battery and get sent up for the balance of the winter."

The women of the Patterson family were in the court room. Ed's wife carried an infant.

Judge Knappen made very brief remarks in passing sentences. He said Dode had been recommended as an industrious and peaceable man when sober, but dangerous and disagreeable when drunk. Ed, got a lighter sentence than the others on account of less activity in the fight with the sheriff's force and on account of his better record.

M. U. R. TRACKERS ARE INTERRUPTED

DOUBLE-LINE WORK IS STOPPED AT KALAMAZOO AVENUE EARLY IN DAY BY CHIEF.

POW WOW IN COUNCIL

Officials of the M. U. R. and Aldermen Cheving the Rag Again—Aldermen Fear Further Crowding of Burdick Street.

Construction work of the M. U. R. on Burdick street north was this morning stopped by the police. It is believed efforts of the company were directed toward threatened double-tracking of all of the street. The track-laying had reached south to Kalamazoo avenue when Chief Allen appeared.

MEMBERS OF A BAD GANG ARE JAILED

Arrest of Williams and Harvey, by Officers Last Night Believed to be Important.

YEGGMAN GANG SAY OFFICERS

Men Said to Be Members of Large Gang of Crooks Operating Near Jackson.

2 SUSPECTS RELEASED

Officers of Railway Company, Private Detectives and Authorities All Along Line Have Worked on Case for Months.

With the arrest of two men last night the authorities believe they are now fairly started in the work of disintegrating an organized gang which for months has been looting freight cars on the Michigan Central between Niles and Jackson. During the operations of the mob thousands of dollars' worth of valuable merchandise has been stolen and hauled off all efforts to get a tangible clue to the perpetrators has been unavailing.

Officers of the railroad company, private detectives and the authorities of the towns along the line have worked on the case for months. Although they labored incessantly, their endeavors to catch any of the gang always led to naught, until last night, when Deputies Burns and Hycoop caught two fellows in the yards of the Michigan Central here, who gave the names of William Williams and Edward Harvey.

Although they protested that they were simply hoboes, the officers declare that they are members of the band of yeggmans which has been robbing the cars and that they have convincing proof of the fact. Twelve dollars was found on one of the pair and thirteen on the other.

The specific charge against them is the robbery of a box car at Battle Creek. Both men will be taken back there.

Shortly after the arrest of the above two, Deputies Hycoop and Joslin caught two other fellows in the yards of the company and placed them under arrest on suspicion. They gave their names as Daniel Golden and Richard Mack and said they were simply attempting to beat their way on a freight train. After an investigation, the officers became convinced that the men were telling the truth and their release was ordered.

TO ARREST TY. COBB FOR STABBING AFFAIR

Report Current That Noted Baseball Star Will Be Jailed on His Return Through Ohio.

Cleveland, O., Oct. 9.—A rumor was current about the court house today that the grand jury would return an indictment against Ty Cobb, Detroit ball player, during the day.

Cobb stabbed Watchman George Stanfield of the hotel Euclid, while the Tigers were playing in Cleveland a few weeks ago. Cobb was allowed to leave the city by the police. It is rumored that a deputy sheriff will arrest Cobb when the train coming from Pittsburg passes the state line into Ohio tonight.

RICH IS ACQUITTED OF MURDER CHARGE

After the joy had slightly subsided, Rich thanked the court and jury, shaking hands with each.

Then he left, a free man, with his wife and his mother. Rich had not slept all night.

ESCAPED WOMAN IS CAPTURED IN CITY

Alice McCaure Breaks out of Asylum but Is Run Down on Grand Avenue—Spent the Night in the Streets.

Alice McCaure, an inmate of the asylum, escaped last night and after an all-night search she was found this morning on Grand avenue. She made her escape through a window while a party was returning from the dining room last evening.

Her escape was discovered about 8 o'clock and searching parties were sent out. About 10 o'clock this morning a party of searchers discovered her on Grand avenue south after she had badly frightened Mrs. Dr. Hall. With little or no trouble the woman consented to return to the asylum. She is about 35 years old.

Lake Captain Convicted of Killing Capt McKinnon—Claimed that McKinnon Betrayed Wife.

ARRESTED CHINAMAN MAY BE MURDERER

Mongolian in Custody at Toledo Answers Description of Chin Who Killed Elsie Sigel in New York Several Months Ago.

Toledo, O., Oct. 9.—Deep mystery enveloping every move of the immigration officers in connection with the case of Jung Chum Gum, the Chinaman arrested on the charge of being illegally in the country, leads to the opinion that the Chinaman is a much more important personage than a violator of the Chinese exclusion act.

An interest taken in the case by "Slister" Magdalene, an Episcopal missionary, who has been working among Toledo Chinese, gives color to the rumor that Gum is from New York City and knows something of the case of Elsie Sigel, the white missionary who was murdered supposedly by Leon Ling.

After months of search the police have failed to locate the murderer and it is remarked by government officers here that Jung Chum Gum bears a marked resemblance to descriptions of Leon Ling.
